Part-A

The plan of action chalked out by the IQAC in the beginning of the year towards quality enhancement and the outcome achieved by the end of the year:

In view of expansion of the scope of education in the neighbouring districts and in the locality in which the college is situated the Authority of the College planned for a comprehensive Educational Development Programme. The programme included some unique aspirations, such as, opening of Post Graduate course in some of the subjects within one year or two, extension of infrastructural facilities through the construction of a new building where more classrooms can be provided, extension of community service to the neighbouring localities of the economically backward classes, Resource mobilization programme by generating new resources within the college campus, linking up the Accounts Section of the Office Block with Principal's room through a LAN system, Extension of research facilities to some of the willing departments providing them with some kiosk spaces for small laboratories needed by the researchers, extension of Interdepartmental Interactions for the Development and Exchange of Knowledge by holding of Seminars and Interactive Programmes etc. At the end of the year, the construction of the annexure building is at a near-completion stage, three PG courses in English, Commerce and Geography have been opened under the affiliation of WBSU, office block has been connected to the Principal's Room.

Part-B:

1. Activities reflecting the goals and objectives of the institution:

Bhairab Ganguly College being deeply involved in developing a place for higher education in this part of West Bengal regularly organizes seminars, symposium and colloquium and eminent scholars are invited to present their papers on such occasions. Moreover, this institution has been consistently trying to meet the diverse academic need of the people by introducing various subjects as well as initiating vocational course with a lot of modern applied curriculum matching with economic perspectives of the day. Furthermore, the institution has maintained a healthy student-teacher relation to restore the academic environment of the college. Very recent introduction of Post-Graduate courses in English, Commerce and Geography is an effective step achieved by the Institution towards its goal of emerging as an epitome of the highest level of education.

2. New academic programmes initiated (UG and PG):

As per prayer of the College the College has been allowed to open three Post-Graduate Courses in English, Commerce and Geography under the affiliation of WBSU. Each of the Post-Graduate Courses comprises four semesters in two years.

3. Innovations in curricular design and transaction:

The curricular design under our University for UG courses is done by the University. However, teachers in their pursuits of day to day teaching often innovate devices which make their teaching exercises easier and more understandable to the students. Electronic devises and Modeling are some of such effective innovations used by the teachers in this institution.

4. Inter-disciplinary programmes started:

One inter-disciplinary programme has been initiated between the Department of Geography and Botany for a study of non-environment relationship in some areas of Birbhum district.

5. Examination reforms implemented:

There is no scope of introducing any new method of examination for the UG courses as the entire schedule of final examination is to be prepared by the university. However, in the case of internal assessment stress has been given particularly on MCQs, Viva-Voce and Group discussions so that students along with their preparation for essay type answers get prepared also for their service-exams. In the case of P.G. Courses Group Discussion, Seminars deliberated by students, Assignment Completion and Preparation of report have been introduced.

23. Courses in which student assessment of teachers is introduced and the action taken on student feedback:

As such, there is no course in the College in which the assessment by the students is done, but a Grievance and Redress Cell has been constructed. This Cell regularly records the grievances of the students as feedback and arranges for necessary steps towards the remedy of the problems.

25. Computerization of administration and the process of admissions and examination results, issue of certificates:

The administration including the office of the College which handles the admission and examination results as well as issue of certificates are totally computerized and are connected by a LAN system.

26. Increase in the infrastructural facilities:

The proposed construction of the 5 storied building is in progress and three floors have been completed till date. These three stories are already been used by different departments. The construction of the two other floors is also continuing at present.

A new meter board room and a guard room have been constructed and provisions for shifting the NSOU and IGNOU are in progress. As soon as the shifting will be completed more rooms will be available for the classes and for other activities.

Very recently the College has purchased a Diesel Generator Set from U.G.C. grant. Moreover, a copier cum printer is being purchased to make the College self-sufficient in printing of question papers and some other necessary documents.

27. Technology up-gradation:

Some of the Honours teaching departments have purchased some new equipment which may be used effectively for the ease of teaching. Some of such equipments include microprocessor kits, work station, visualizer, LCD projectors etc.

28. Computer and internet access and training to teachers and students:

Computers with internet access have been given to eleven departments and another computer with internet access has been installed in the staff room. At present maximum number of teachers are computer literate and they usually do not require any training except for any specific software. Students, on the other hands are being trained under the guidance of various departments with computers facilities. Moreover, sometimes they get trained privately also in their home or outside during vacations.

29. Financial aid to students:

The College has a policy in connection with the endowment of aid to the students in the form of free studentship and the following percentage of concession in the form of financial aid is offered to the needy ones.

B.A. (Hons. + Gen.) :40% B.Sc. (Hons. + Gen) :20% B. Com (Hons. + Gen) :30% (Approx) Avg. :33.3%

As per rule 10% of the collected fees are to be disbursed as financial assistance to the poor students, but in view of the socio-economic condition of the neighbouring localities the college disburses about 25% of the collected fees among the needy students in the form of free studentship.

30. Support from the Alumni Association and its Activities:

Activities of Alumni Association are mainly carried out on department basis. Excursions of short duration, holding of cultural programme in the department, attending seminars organized by the department, developing linkages between the department and external research institutions are a few of such activities.

31. Support from the Parent-Teacher Association and its Activities: The Parent-Teacher Association previously constructed has not remained very active and the departments have introduced regular meeting with parents according to their conveniences.

32. Health service:

NSS provides Health service to the students apart from the services of Students' Health Home.

33. Performance in sports activities:

The College encourages sports activities not only through the holding of Annual sports and athletics meet but also by arranging various intra-college tournaments. Apart from that students of the College regularly participate in different tournaments held by the University, CAB and other organizations. In such tournament their performance is praise worthy and they win trophies and medals every year. The following statement gives an account of their performance during 2009-10.

The College Team participated in the Football Tournament organized by West Bengal State University and won the Runners Cup. It also qualified for the Eliot Shield.

Kaushik Das of 3^{rd} year, Avishek Ghosh of 2^{nd} year & Tuhin Biswas of 1^{st} year became Table Tennis Champion at the Table Tennis Tournament of the University.

A girl student of 1st year became the Table Tennis Champion in the Girls Category of the same tournament.

Susmita Dutta of 1st year Gen. stood 2nd in the 100m. and 200m. of inter collegiate championship; she also participated at the national level.

Sajal Das of 2nd year General participated in Judo at national level.

Shyamali Baidya of 2nd year, Gen. participated in Kabadi at Inter University.

34. Incentives to outstanding sportspersons:

Equipments, Jerseys, Boots and financial grants are given to students whenever required.

35. Student achievements and awards:

Students participate in various tournaments and quiz competitions and are awarded number of times, for instance, three students of Geography Honours participated in a Geo-Quiz at Ashutosh College of Calcutta and were awarded for third position.

36. Activities of the Guidance and Counselling Cell:

As such no counselling cell is there, but teachers and the Principal regularly guide and counsel the students to come out of the hazards they face in their academic life.

37. Placement services provided to students:

Reputed organizations such as IBM, Frank Finn, NIIT, HCL, SPANCO etc. have visited this institution and have recruited a few of our students on temporary as well as on substantive basis.

38. Development programmes for non-teaching staff:

Four members of the non-teaching staff were sent to a software developing company for specific training in the software before the purchase of the same, so that they could work with that at the time of admission and at various office works.

- **39. Best practices of the institution:** The College tries to uphold the academic spirit of the surrounding locality by organizing seminars, symposiums, workshops etc. and inviting the schools on such occasions. Some awareness programmes against gender sensitization have also been organized and local inhabitants including students have been invited to attend the programmes. Moreover, as there is no large ground in the entire area and the college has one, the college allows many sports and cultural activities of the locality to be held on this ground.
- **40.** Linkages developed with National / International, academic / research bodies: Some linkages with national, international, academic / research bodies have been developed by teachers independently. Many of them are allowed to visit overseas countries for carrying out these research activities.

41. Any other relevant information:

A remedial course for the under privileged students has been started under the convener-ship of Prof. Makhleshwer Rahaman.

Arrangements are being made to introduce a full-fledged course of professional video editing on Mac platform in the department of Journalism and Mass Communication. This will be beneficial to the students of the honours course of the department. Efforts are being made to generate some resources by allowing some other outside students to be admitted in the abovementioned course on the basis of reasonable fees structure.

Students' Union organizes Blood Donation Camp every year on the College Foundation Day.

They also arrange for First Aid in any case of accident within the College premises. At the time of new admission Students' Union opens information cum Guidance Counter for the new comers. They also arrange for drinking water for the candidates and their guardians at the time of such admissions, because it takes a long time for the entire procedure.

Moreover, Bhairab Ganguly College is the only college, under West Bengal State University which has opened up Urdu Honours for the benefit of Muslim students.






